



## WELCOME TO Beautiful RIVERSIDE

Riverside, the County Seat and largest City in Riverside County is in the heart of scenic Southern California. Much of Riverside's beauty lies in thousands of acres of orange groves and in its 130,000 street trees.

Founded in 1870 and incorporated in 1883, present population is 146,000 with 302,000 in the trade area and an estimated 450,000 in the County. The City covers 72 square miles, an area larger than Manhattan Island. It has a rich agricultural background, and the "Parent" Navel Orange tree, from which all the navel oranges in California's multi-million dollar citrus industry descended, still flourishes in a park in the center of the city (State historical monument #20).

Riverside is a major education center. Included within the city are University of California at Riverside (UCR). California Baptist College, La Sierra Campus of Loma Linda University, Riverside City College, California School for Deaf and Sherman Indian High School World famous Riverside International Raceway and March Air Force Base (SAC), Headquarters, Fifteenth Air Force, are located at the Southeast City limits.

Mt. Rubidoux, site of the first outdoor interdenominational Easter Sonrise service, towers above the downtown area and dominates the skyline. Adventurous visitors can reach the cross at the summit via the winding one way road starting at the West end of 9th St. The view is breathtaking.

in the heart of downtown is the Mission Inn Garden Hotel (State Historical Monument #761) renowned for its Spanish Mission architecture and charm which reflects the Riverside way of life. Daily tours are conducted through the Inn to view the unique construction and the art treasures. Civic and commercial buildings and the beautifully landscaped Mall in downtown have followed the early California theme, and coupled with the street tree planting program, have created an unusually attractive atmos phere for shoppers. There are thirteen shopping areas in the city ranging from neighborhood centers to the Riverside Plaza Mall with double deck parking and the new Tyler Mall. The 55 acre Auto Center including seven major auto agencies plus a service and commercial area has drawn worldwide attention.

A scenic drive around the City should include the above plus the beautiful residential areas at the foot of Mt. Rubidoux, those surrounding Victoria Country Club, and along Victoria Avenue among the orange groves. Riverside boasts of 23 parks, beautiful Lake Evans, seven golf courses within 10 minutes of downtown, seven public pools, community playhouse, art center, museum and Senior Citizens center. Cultural groups include the Art Association, Ballet, Symphony, Opera, Children's Theatre. Community Players, Flower show, organized hobby groups, and nearby Jurupa Cultural Center.

#### CLIMATE

The climate in Riverside is warm and dry with 225 to 250 clear days a year. Mean average temperature in summer months is around 75° with a max. av. high of 94.1° in July, the hottest month. Fortunately the humidity in July keeps below the 40% mark on the average, and visitors from the damper coastal areas flock to Riverside to enjoy the warm dry air. Rainfall average is 11.04 inches per year, mostly in Dec., Jan., Feb.

#### NEWSPAPERS, RADIO AND TV

The Daily Enterprise (County Morning Paper) and the Press (City Evening Paper) are published by the Press-Enterprise, and offer a full AP, UP, and other press service coverage of local and world events. The weekly Arlington Times reports news of that area. Several AM and FM radio stations give excellent local news reporting and a variety of programming (inc. FM Multiplex), and all Los Angeles radio and TV stations come in strong. Most hotel/ motel rooms have TV.

#### FOOD AND FUN

Part of the fun of traveling and conventioning is visiting new restaurants and sampling unusual foods. Riverside offers a wide selection from the exotic foods of the orient and polynesia right down to good old home cookin' from all over the USA. Everything from southern fried to New England boiled, and a wide selection of steaks and sea food.

Our Spanish tradition is well represented by several restaurants which truly excel in South of the Border specialties and atmosphere, and from the other side of the world we can offer the finest in continental cuisine.

Several excellent night clubs offer dinner dancing and top entertainment.





## Animal keeping laws irk residents in La Sierra

Faced with growing discontent from La Sierra residents over enforcement of certain zoning rules, and neighborhood petitions reportedly containing more than 1,000 signatures, Riverside planning commissioners are trying again to come to grips with the problem of livestock keeping.

The problem has been developing ever since La Sierra annexed to Riverside in 1964. It is one of the city's most rural districts and many residents, including youngsters in FFA and 4-H programs, keep farm animals.

But some of the animal keeping is contrary to the city's zoning rules. according to zoning enforcement officials. They cite situations where there are too many animals for the size of the property, or where animals are penned too close to a neighbor's house, or where the property is not big enough — the minimum is one acre - to qualify for farm-type animals.

Last fall these officials' enforcement activities prompted citizens' complaints to the City Council. The council instructed the city Planning Department to review existing rules and asked the Planning Commission

to hold a public hearing to determin if the rules should be changed.

The planning staff subsequently did a study which compared River side's livestock rules with those o other nearby jurisdictions and liste a number of possible new approaches the city could take.

The staff report, however, concluded by recommending that the rules not be changed and that the city step up its enforcement activities.

Basically the rules allow two farm-type animals such as horses, cows, sheep and goats on properties of one acre or more in the residential agricultural and single-family residential zones. An extra animal is allowed for each additional half-acre.

The commission held its public. hearing Nov. 21 and voted 5-2 to accept the recommendation which then was sent to the council. The council has not yet set the matter for public hearing.

Wednesday several La Sierra residents led by Jim Scholl and Don Garretson complained to the commission that there has been no adequate public notice of the November meeting and that none of the concerned people in La Sierra had known about it. (The hearing, planning officials confirmed, was scarcely attended by the public.)

Bob Meese of the planning staff said a legal advertisement was published in the newspaper but such notices are often overlooked. It would have been impossible, he said, to send everyone in the city a notice. toll said a committee in La Sier

- 4. To focus on the importance of community involvement and participation in furthering and therefore, strengthening Bilingual-Bicultural education.
- 5. To provide trustee members, supervisors and district-level administrators with informational sessions on Bilingual-Bicultural Education.

#### **II. CONFERENCE WORKSHOPS:**

As was the case at the 1973 Riverside Bilingual Conference, approximately 90% of the workshops will be conducted by classroom teachers or resource teachers directly involved in Bilingual Education.





#### I. History

1973 - NABE born

- National Bilingual Director Albar Peña calls for a state bilingual organization during a Southern California Bilingual Conference.
- State Department of Education Bilingual Task Force and California State University at Fullerton personnel had seen need for input into bilingual education via an organization.
- Acting officers elected by group.

#### 1973 - CABE - First Offspring

- Same people saw need for a state organization to complement national organization and narrow area for viable input to bilingual education - CABE emerges.
- Acting officers elected .

#### 1974 - NABE and CABE Separate

- CABE officially disassociates itself from NABE and interim advisory board moves to:
  - adopt interim constitution.
  - establish more positions for officers of CABE.
  - set dues' structure.
  - formulate guidelines for organization of chapters.
  - get CABE incorporated.
  - promote members: professional (see by-laws), para-professional, community and students state wide.
  - to institutionalize bilingual education in the state of California.
  - to promote bilingual education as the continuous use of two languages, one of which is English as a means of instruction and introducing concepts and information and in the context of two cultures.

#### Other activities

- Simultaneously, while going thru beginnings of forming a solid organization, CABE was involved and asked to participate in:

#### Legislation

- Board members testified before California Legislature, Assembly Ways' and Means Committee and Senate Finance Committee, on behalf of AB2817, Assemblyman Peter Chacon's bilingual education bill.
- Board members assist Assemblyman Chacon to revise his bilingual education bill - the new AB2284 - first attempt to make bilingual education mandatory in California.
- CABE members get California constituents to send letters and telegrams to the Governor on behalf of bilingual education bill.

- Sponsored Southern California Bilingual Education Conference.
- Sponsored Regional Conferences North, Central, South on evaluation.
- with Sacramento on Bilingual Education and the Law.
- with CTPL on Bilingual/Cross Cultural Credentialing.

- with CEEA on Bilingual Education (several)

- with Los Angeles County for Paraprofessionals.
