~A CABE Invitation to a Special Event~

Since 1989 the **California Association for Bilingual Education** (CABE) has offered educators, parents, and students numerous opportunities for learning how to *transform* education into a more democratic and academically successful process by weaving the theoretical frameworks of bilingual/bicultural education and critical pedagogy together. In 1995 CABE published a book, *Reclaiming Our Voices: Bilingual Education, Critical Pedagogy, and Praxis*, that featured the narratives of individuals who were applying what they had learned through their participation in CABE's numerous institutes and workshops. In January of 1996, the first paper in CABE's new five-year *Occasional Paper Series* on the same topic was published.

The public response to these publications, institutes, and conference workshops has been a very positive, growing, and encouraging one. At the same time, it has demonstrated to CABE the need to treat the union of critical pedagogy and bilingual/bicultural education in a systematic and long-term fashion. Therefore, CABE is offering a **third** summer institute in its *Transforming Education for Cultural and Linguistic Democracy* professional development series.

CABE is confident that all who choose to attend, "Asserting Our Voices in Conservative Times: Keeping Hope and Democracy Alive," will find its theme timely, appropriate, and highly useful in sustaining their personal and professional energy, integrity, and hope during these difficult times for bilingual/bicultural educators, parents, and programs. By limiting attendance to the first 100 people who accept our invitation before June 24, participants will be provided an intimate context in which to explore this theme with others who share similar concerns. Will you be among those taking advantage of this unique opportunity?

The institute is designed to offer you a participatory context for *using* your own personal and professional experiences and understandings as the primary catalysts for exploring the institute's theme. For five days you will experience the empowering sensation of *praxis* as you alternatively engage in dialogue, critical reflection, and action planning with nationally known scholars in critical pedagogy and bilingual/bicultural education, practicing critical educators, and students and parents who are participating in critical education programs.

CABE knows this will be a demanding endeavor. It will require you to both *affirm* and *question* much of what you now take for granted about yourself, others, education, and society. It will involve exposing how the political and educational domains are inextricably intertwined, knowledge that will ultimately assist you in constructing educational conditions that allow others to empower themselves with the *critical hope* and *critical literacy* necessary for moving us all closer to fulfilling the American dream of living in a *truly* participatory democracy.

To encourage and support your active participation you will spend most of your time in dialogue groups composed of ten individuals, one of whom will be an institute facilitator. And because we ask that you take your meals and lodging on-site, relaxing opportunities will exist for individual exchanges with the institute facilitators, your colleagues, and students. Prior to the institute you will receive a special 50 page issue of CABE's new *Occasional Paper Series*. It will contain short papers specific to the institute's theme. We ask that you read it before arriving at the institute and respond to any questions the authors may pose.

Participation in the institute also will call upon you to *share yourself* in several ways. One option will be through "interact" sessions where you will have a scheduled time to *initiate* a dialogue around a critical issue of concern to you (see registration form). Another option will be the opportunity to contribute to the design of a *network* whereby participants can remain in contact and continue to exchange ideas. Additionally, we will be asking you to make plans for how you will involve others at your work site in a dialogue group similar to what you experienced at the institute. Finally, we will ask that you consider becoming committed to CABE's long-term effort to bring critical pedagogy increasingly to the attention of an even wider population of educators within the bilingual/bicultural community.

On behalf of CABE and the institute's coordinators—Jean Frederickson and Edmundo Norte—we wish to express our pleasure at being able to extend this invitation to you. We look forward to your attendance and welcome your participation at the institute!

Who Will Facilitate?

A team of individuals with community, university, and classroom experience. (The following is not a complete list.)

- Peter McLaren is an associate professor in the Graduate School of Education, University of California, Los Angeles. He is widely published in the fields of critical pedagogy, critical multicultural education, and critical literacy. In his highly praised book, *Life in Schools*, he used critical pedagogy to understand his high school teaching experiences.
- Peter Park is a faculty member of the Fielding Institute in Santa Barbara, California. Born in Korea, he has experienced what it means to form a bicultural identity in the United States. His current personal and professional interest centers around the generation of social change

through participatory research with community groups, an area in which he has also published.

▶ Pia Moriarty is an Instructor at Stanford University where she teaches in the "Cultures, Ideas, and Values" program and is developing an ethnographic approach to the study of hope/desire/aspiration as a force in people's lives and institutions. She has extensive experience in applying Paulo Freire's pedagogy in California, Central America, and Portugal.

Who Should Attend?

CABE invites individuals who are:

- Committed to expanding their understanding and use of what constitutes a critical bilingual/bicultural pedagogy.
- Willing to experience some discomfort as they examine their own educational assemptions and practices within the

larger context of society and its underlying assumptions and institutions.

- Motivated to introducing their colleagues to a critical bilingual/bicultural pedagogy.
- Committed to attending and actively participating in all five days of the institute.
- Willing to *read* a 50 page booklet specifically written for the institute prior to its beginning on July 28.
- Able to come as a team composed of two or more individuals from the same or near-by work-sites. (If this is not possible, individuals are still welcome to attend.)

What is the Focus?

CABE sees the institute as a context for engaging in critical dialogue, reflection, and action planning with nationally known scholars, practicing critical educators, and students and their parents for the purpose of coming to know:

- ♦ What it *means* to be a critical bilingual/bicultural educator, student, or parent in these conservative times and how we can begin to *resist and re-shape* the anti-democratic discourses of far-right conservatism.
- **How** to *identify* and *question* key concepts and features of critical pedagogy for their potential to transform education and to generate *critical hope, critical literacy,* and personal renewal.
- How to build personal and political support systems and communities of solidarity.
- How to critically deal with such issues as racial/cultural injustice, gender inequity, and the relationship between power, knowledge, language, and privilege.
- How to use histories of Euro-Americans to create spaces of possibilities for them to be allies and advocates.
- How to examine our everyday life habits for the ways in which we participate in reproducing oppressive social structures and personal relationships and how we can act to resist and transform them.
- How to integrate and apply the concepts, processes, and practices you have experienced at the institute to create a critical approach to education for use in your own work situation.

3. PAYMENT REQUIREMENTS

Checks or money orders preferred. Purchase orders accepted if necessary and must accompany registration forms. 4. POSTMARK DEADLINE
